# AHEPA Hospital Thessaloniki

*A Diaspora Legacy Born from War,  
Sustained by Hope*

There are buildings that serve a purpose and there are buildings that carry a soul. The **AHEPA University Hospital in Thessaloniki** belongs firmly to the second category.

At a time when Greece lacked resources, infrastructure, even hope, AHEPA stepped in with something far greater than money: **belief**.

**Build in 1949 from the generosity of Greek Americans who refused to watch their homeland struggle alone after the devastation of World War II, the hospital stands as one of the most powerful symbols of diaspora love.**

Belief that a wounded nation could heal. Belief that education and medicine could rebuild what war had shattered.

When the hospital opened its doors, it was a promise. A promise that the Greeks of America would never forget where they came from. A promise that Thessaloniki would rise again.

Today, the AHEPA Hospital remains one of Greece's most important university hospitals, a place where science, compassion, and legacy meet. Generations of doctors trained within its walls now serve in leading medical centers across the United States, carrying with them a piece of Thessaloniki in every operating room and research lab.

**And the bond continues.** In a recent visit, Supreme President Chris Kaitson reaffirmed AHEPA's commitment with a major donation, strengthening the hospital's future and honoring its past.

The AHEPA Hospital is a bridge between Greece and its diaspora, between history and tomorrow, between the wounds of the past and the healing of the future.







The Greek American community has every reason to be proud of **Eleni Voudouris**, daughter of Brother Vasilis Voudouris and recent District 21 scholarship recipient.

Eleni distinguished herself internationally as a member of the University of Illinois Urbana–Champaign (UIUC) team that earned **second place in the prestigious Cyber 9/12 Strategy Competition hosted by the Atlantic Council**. Competing against top institutions such as Stanford University and the U.S. Air Force Academy, her achievement stands as a remarkable milestone for a young woman entering the demanding field of cybersecurity.

A Computer Science major with a minor in Business, Eleni is also involved in research at UIUC’s renowned Parasol Lab, contributing to cutting-edge work in distributed systems and cyber defense. At the same time, she remains deeply rooted in her Greek identity as **cofounder of the Illinakia Greek Folk Dance Group**, promoting Hellenic culture through traditional dance.

# Coffee HOUR





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**Hellenic Collection**



*One of the most significant and comprehensive collections of Greek books, archives, rare materials, and cultural artifacts outside of Greece . A living repository of Hellenism in the American West.*

In Sacramento, far from our ancestral roots yet close to the heart of the Greek diaspora, there is a place that breathes Greece. A place that safeguards memories, stories, language, art, and culture. A true sanctuary of Hellenism.

This place is the **Tsakopoulos Hellenic Collection at Sacramento State University**, one of the most significant collections of Greek books, archives, and materials outside of Greece. A collection born from vision, strengthened by generosity, and still flourishing thanks to people who deeply believe that Hellenism is not only a past to honor, but a future to build.

The history of the collection is a journey in itself. It begins with the library of the Speros Basil Vryonis Center, passes through thousands of donations, personal libraries, archives, and collections, and **today encompasses 83,000 volumes including circulating books, journal holdings, nearly 500 linear feet of personal papers and institutional archives, electronic resources, non-print media materials, rare books, art, and artifacts.**



Behind every donation lies a story: families who offered the libraries of their loved ones, universities that entrusted their materials, foundations that provided support, individuals who wanted their books to have a future, and members of the Greek diaspora who wished to leave a mark.

The Tsakopoulos Hellenic Collection is a mosaic of generosity. A work built by many, with love, conviction, and a profound sense of responsibility toward Greek heritage.

At the center of it all stands the person who gave this project its soul:

### **George I. Paganelis**

Since 2003, when he became curator of the collection, George Paganelis has been a guardian of memory, a storyteller, a research companion, and a cultural ambassador. He is the person who kept the collection alive, expanded it, and opened it to the world. With a level of dedication rarely encountered, he curated thousands of volumes, organized archives that might otherwise have been lost, welcomed donations and transformed them into structured knowledge, supported students, the only one of its kind west of the Mississippi and brought entire libraries from authors, scholars,


journalists, historians, and artists into the collection. It is no exaggeration to say that without George Paganelis, the Tsakopoulos Hellenic Collection would not be what it is today: an international point of reference for Hellenism.

The collection is a living space. Here, lectures take place, exhibitions are hosted, conferences are organized, researchers from around the world arrive, dissertations, articles, and books are written, and new ideas about Hellenism are born. The Tsakopoulos Hellenic Collection is a cultural beacon illuminating the Greek presence in America.

A place where memory finds its voice and continues to inspire.

# A Life Lived with Honor: Brother John Tatarakis

Brother John Tatarakis, a devoted member of the Sacramento Chapter for 44 years, passed away on January 25, 2026, following a brief illness, just ten days short of his 94th birthday. A former U.S. Marine, Brother John was a retired Sacramento Police detective who served for many years as an undercover narcotics officer. He was widely admired by all who knew him for his gentle, kind, and warm personality. Military service ran deep in his family. His older brother, Corporal George Tatarakis, has been listed as Missing in Action since the Korean War.

Brother John's funeral service was held at St. Katherine Greek Orthodox Church in Elk Grove and was attended by several hundred friends and family members from across Northern California and throughout the United States. He was laid to rest at the Sacramento Valley National Cemetery in Dixon.

Eleni Glykatzi-Arveler, one of the most luminous figures of modern Hellenism, passed away leaving behind a legacy that transcends borders and generations. A visionary and a scholar of global stature, she became the first woman to serve as Rector of the Sorbonne, honoring Greece at every step of her remarkable journey. A distinguished Byzantinologist whose work and public voice helped restore Byzantium to the center of European history, not as a dimmed epilogue than a durable, governing civilization. With her integrity, intellect, and unwavering devotion to Greek culture, she emerged as a true ambassador of our heritage on the international academic stage. Her life embodied excellence, strength, and the timeless values that shaped the Hellenic world. Her loss leaves a profound void, yet her legacy will continue to inspire for years to come.

**B**efore photography, the story of 1821 lived only through words. Until European philhellene painters transformed the Greek struggle into images that still move us today. Their canvases captured the courage, the grief, and the unbreakable resolve of a people fighting for freedom after centuries of oppression. Through their eyes, the world first witnessed the heroism of the Greek fighters and the sacrifices that shaped a new nation.

**A**rtists like Delacroix, Aivazovsky, and von Hess became advocates. Their paintings, from the haunting scenes of Chios to the symbolic figure of Greece rising from the ruins of Missolonghi, stirred European public opinion and helped ignite support for the Greek cause. Each work is both a tribute and a testimony, preserving moments we would otherwise never have seen.

# Protecting the Blue That Sustains Us


Every year on March 22, **World Water Day** reminds us that the planet's most essential natural resource is under increasing threat. Climate change, overuse, and pollution are placing immense pressure on water systems across the globe, from major continental rivers to fragile island ecosystems.

According to a recent United Nations [report \(January 2026\)](#), the world has entered a new era of “**global water bankruptcy**.” Many regions can no longer return to historical water baselines. “Normal” is gone. The report calls for a fundamental reset of global water policy, grounded in science and honesty.

The warning signs are already visible. In the United States, the **Colorado River** has been experiencing declining flow for decades, pushing reservoirs like Lake Mead to historic lows. In Greece, the **Mornos Reservoir**, the primary water source for the Athens metropolitan area, faces growing strain due to reduced rainfall and rising demand. These examples reflect a global challenge that will shape the future of water security.

In this reality, protecting marine and freshwater ecosystems becomes more critical than ever. **AHEPA Chapter Silicon Valley 251** is proud to support with a generous donation, the work of **Aegean Rebreath**, an organization dedicated to safeguarding Greece's seas and empowering local communities through hands-on environmental action.

For Greeks living far from home, Easter is a thread that ties the present to everything we carry within us. Holy Week arrives with the same quiet anticipation: the hymns of our childhood, the scent of incense drifting through dimly lit churches, the glow of candlelight reflected on familiar faces. 

## Pi: THE INFINITE GREEK THAT SHAPES THE WORLD

Every March 14th, the world celebrates Pi Day, a global tribute to the most iconic number in mathematics. **A number that stretches into infinity**, never repeats, and somehow manages to appear everywhere: in circles, in waves, in architecture, in physics, in the algorithms that power our phones. Yet behind this universal symbol lies a truth we often overlook: pi is profoundly, unmistakably Greek.

Its very symbol,  $\pi$ , is the Greek letter that has carried the meaning of “perimeter” for centuries. The words “geometry,” “mathematics,” and “perimeter” are Greek. And the first person to calculate pi with astonishing precision was Archimedes, a Greek mind whose influence still echoes through modern science.

**Pi is a living testament to enduring Greek brilliance.** It has become a cultural phenomenon. Students memorize its digits for fun. Social media turns it into memes. Some celebrate Pi Day by eating... pie. And every time we use GPS, stream a video, or open a map app, pi is quietly working in the background, doing what it has always done: **connecting ideas, solving problems, shaping the world**

 use pi to determine the moment of inertia of a cylinder or disc rotating about a central axis.



# Mother's Day



*A journey into maternal  
love through the words of  
Greece's greatest poets.*

There are words that return to us like breath, like memory, like prayer. And among them, none carries more tenderness, more weight, more quiet power than the word mother.

Greek poets, from Palamas to Ritsos, from Vrettakos to Elytis, saw in her the symbol of roots, resilience, and unconditional love.

For **Palamas**, the mother is the first comfort and the final gaze. In his poem *Her Last Look*, the maternal figure becomes a light that never fades, a gaze that follows the child even after she is gone, a sacred presence shaping a person long before they understand the world. **Ritsos**, raised amid loss and upheaval, saw the mother as a pillar, a woman who carries pain without breaking. In his poems, she is "a door open to the light," the quiet heroine of everyday life.

**Vrettakos** speaks of the mother as if speaking of the sun, "the light that gave me birth." His mother is kindness, simplicity, purity.

Elytis lets her permeate his poetry like the sea, like a caress, like the light of the Aegean, the source of innocence and beauty in the world.

**Karyotakis** sees her as solace in sorrow, the one presence capable of softening a world that wounds.

Each poet saw her differently, yet all saw her with awe.

*As light. As root. As memory...  
As a love that asks for nothing and gives everything.*

Greek poetry is filled with mothers who light vigil lamps, wait by windows, whisper prayers, hold the world steady with their hands. And through these words, every reader finds their own mother, their own first homeland.


